





EXPLANATORY NOTES

The health workers counted as 'nurses with midwifery training' received training in a limited number of midwifery competencies and do not meet international standards for midwifery. For modelling potential met need, they were treated in the same way as professional nurses, i.e. assuming that they spend 44% of their clinical time on SRMNAH care and that they are competent to deliver the same set of SRMNAH interventions as a professional

Before the direct-entry midwifery programme was launched, there was a 6-month bridging course to bring nurse-midwives up to the global standard of 18 months' post-nursing education. The bridging course is not currently running, but may run again in the future.

There was a recruitment freeze in 2019 owing to a dispute over licensing, which has since been resolved.
